

DR. TARAKNATH DAS, Columbia University, New York, telegraphed: "My profound sorrow at passing away of Paramhansa Yogananda. Sympathy to members of Fellowship. Peace."

SRF CENTER IN LONDON, ENGLAND. Mrs. Gertrude White, secretary, wrote: "I saw visions on March 7th I had never experienced before. I was pleased because, I thought, I was progressing spiritually. I did not understand that Master was then passing on. I feel that strange and wonderful things happened during those four days—Friday to Tuesday. The atmosphere in London was disturbed; I could sense it; and the stillness that came over everything on the eleventh was unbelievable."

Mrs. White writes later: "At the last meeting of the SRF London Center we had a long meditation on Master. Mr. Nandi gave a beautiful talk on Life. He explained that a great master like Paramhansaji would pass in full consciousness of truth because even while encased in a physi-

cal body he had always lived in truth."

We are convinced that SRF will continue its blessed work for suffering mankind ever more intensely and successfully. May our dear Master, in the company of his grand gurus, ever warch over the work and fate of SRF."

advices. Today we are faced with the immense responsibility of realizing the purport of his nectarlike speeches. Let us pray to his immortal soul to show us the right path in life."



TRIBUTE FROM "NEW AGE INTERPRETER"

New Age Interpreter of Los Angeles devoted a page of its April 1952 issue to a tribute to Paramhansa Yogananda. The article follows:

"It was a dramatic and highlighted moment that concluded the remarkable career of Swami Yogananda.* It came March 7th in the Biltmore Hotel at Los Angeles, as he was on the platform concluding a brief talk on his favorite subject of goodwill and fraternal relations between peoples.

"Instantle the large audience rose to its feet and remained standing for a brief period of silent prayer, surrounding the Swami with the love his eloquent words had already evoked from their responsive bearts. Under such beneficent auspices it was that his spirit stepped across the border dividing the field of labor here from the sphere of activity over there.

"Swami Yogananda's work was of wide scope, of extraordinary power, and of rich productivity. On the platform and in the classroom he reached great numbers through his lifelong public ministry. His writings were extensive and his teachings attracted a following numbering millions. Among his best known works are Whispers from Eternity and Autobiography of a Yogi. The latter, published five years ago, is now in its third edition and has been translated into several languages. It relates many marvels that the author himself experienced.

"Swami Yogananda was born in India. In 1920 he came to this country as a delegate from India to the International Congress of Religions at Boston, and from then on America became his home. In 1925 he founded the Self-Realization Fellowship Church of All Religions with Western headquarters at Mount Washington, Los Angeles, which has since grown until it now embraces eighty-four centers scattered in all parts of the world. These centers are of three types: study centers, churches, and colonies. Mount Washington is a colony where dedicated ones take up residence and give their full time to the work. In California there are two other colonies, one in Hollywood and another in Encinitas.

^{*}His proper title, since 1935, is Paramhansa Yogananda. In Docember of that year bis guru bestowed on him the higher monastic title of "Paramhansa."

There are also a center, church, and vegetarian restaurant in Los Angeles.

'Swami Yogananda made an outstanding cultural and spiritual contribution in furthering the cause of better understanding between East and West. He combined in a conspicuous degree the spiritual idealism of India with practical activity and ability to command material resources which is the dominant characteristic of the West. The two found in him a blend, enabling him to accomplish a work of amazing proportions in the course of no more than three brief decades. The centers he established, the great numbers he inspired to nobler living, and the ideals he planted in the common consciousness of humanity will ever remain a monument to his notable achievement. May his dynamic spirit find multiplied scope for service in the realm of larger treedom where he now functions."

IN YOGANANDAJI'S NAME-8000 MEALS

"To give food is good; to give a job is better. To give spiritual food is best of all," as Paramhansaji so often said. Thus, he rejoiced at the spiritual sustenance offered by the YSS Centers in India, but was also concerned over the material plight of his people. Therefore, it is especially fitting that one of the first "Living Memorials" offered in his name should come from the Meals For Millions Foundation, Los Angeles.

Early in March the SRF Voluntary League ordered 540 pounds of MPF,* to be distributed by the SRF-YSS medical dispensary at Ranchi, India; and the Foundation donated an additional 242 pounds. This order, totaling 782 pounds (more than 6,250 meals), was awaiting shipment when Florence Rose, Executive Secretary of the Foundation, attended the banquet at the Biltmore Hotel on March 7th. "I had never seen Paramhansa Yoganandaji before," she said later. "Of course, his spiritual magnetism was at once apparent. I was impressed by his appearance, but particularly by his manner and his way of speaking—the kindness and simplicity that are shown by all truly great people. I was so happy that our two organizations had made this useful contact—and then, that unexpected moment of tragedy! We want you all to know that the Foundation is adding 1,000 pounds of MPF to the shipment we had prepared. This is being sent as a Memorial Offering, in Paramhansa Yogananda's name,"

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H. E. BINAY R. SEN



The India News Bulletin, published by the Embassy of India in Washington, D.C., gives the following information about India's new Ambassador to America:

Binay Ranjan Sen, appointed by the Government of India as the new Ambassador to the U.S.A., arrived in Washington November 26, 1951. He succeeds Madame Vijaya Lakshmi Pandit.

Mr. Sen was born January I. 1898, and was educated at Calcutta and Oxford Universities. He joined the Indian Civil Service in 1922 and held various administrative and secretariat positions under the Bengal Government, including that of Revenue Secretary. He was Director-General of Food in the Government of India during 1943-45, and was Secretary to the Department of Agriculture 1945-47. In 1947 he was India's Minister at the Washington Embassy, and represented the Government of India on several United Nations agencies. Mr. Sen led the Indian Delegation to the Economic and Social Council in February 1949 and served again as India's Minister in Washington from March 1949 to March 1950. He was then posted to Rome as Ambassador and, later, was concurrently accredited as Ambassador to Yugoslavia.

Mr. Sen married Chiroprova Chatterjee in 1931; they have three daughters. The eldest, Nandini, is being educated in America. because Yoganandaji set an example that affected many who never even met him. That example elicits kind deeds and words: "Now," said Mrs. Rose in a letter to Sri Dey at Ranchi, "we are among those who share the feeling of loss that you and others closely associated with Paramhansa Yogananda experience."

Thoughts at the Last Public Rites



Mr. Carroll W. Parcher, noted publisher of the Glendale, California, News-Press, devoted his editorial column on March 13th to an account of the last public rites for Paramhansaji, as follows:

"Possibly Rudyard Kipling's often quoted verse: 'Oh, East is East, and West is West, and never the twain shall meet, Till earth and sky stand presently at God's great Indoment Sent, is as true today as when he wrote the ballad of East and West in 1889. But as you watched and heard the combined Hindu and Christian rites at the funeral of Parambansa Yogananda, one of India's noted religious leaders and founder of the Self-Realization Fellowship, you had the feeling that here, perhaps, in the mingling of two of the world's great religious philosophies, might be found a common ground on which the twain might finally meet, after all. Rajasi Janakananda, new leader of the Fellowship, expressed the same feeling when he said that the East has much to learn from the West, which, in turn, may give to and learn from the East. Binay R. Sen, India's Ambassador to America, said much the same thing in a different way as he eulogized the Paramhansa and his devoted effort to make clear the ancient philosophies of India to the world.

"One of the passages which Swami Premananda recited from the Hindu scriptures expressed the eternal belief of men, both East and West,

In his eulogy of Paramhansaji on this occasion, the Ambassador said: "Death found no victory in him." Later events proved that His Excellency's words were literally true. After death Yoganandaji's pure yogic body did not manifest the usual signs of dissolution.

"It may be, you felt, as you listened to the swelling of the organ notes in the universal language of music as produced by the talented fingers of Korla Pandit, and as you watched Hindus and Christians, Indians and Americans, joining rogether in tribute to a beloved holy man, that in the centuries to come men of different faiths can find unity in a common goal—that the East and the West may finally and happily meet."



A Letter From A Disciple



December, 1940

Dear _____

Happening to know that having to give up your room so often disturbs you, I would like to tell you some of my experiences. It was this same unhappy attitude of the mind that brought about the greatest battle of my whole spiritual life. In retrospect everything else seems easy in comparison.

I could understand why I must give up wrong things, but I did not know that the seeker for God must lay all at His feet, must hold nothing back. I do not remember that I ever wanted the best for myself. I was willing to share. This is the way I remember myself in the years that have passed away like a dream, leaving me nothing but peace where I remember that I lived up to my ideal; pain if, when I sit in judgment upon myself, I see that I fell short. What I could not understand was why everything must go, why things that were right, that were mine, that harmed no one, why all the dear little rights and privileges must be taken from me. But they were so taken by God.

It was during the first world war, and the day came when I compared my life to no man's land, for everything upon which I had built the happiness of my life lay in ruins at my feet. I alone was standing erect. It was God thrusting me out of a life of dependence upon small

comforts to one that should be lived for Him alone.

I want to tell you that this matter of a room and a place to keep my clothes caused me a great deal of pain—such was my temperament. I had only two little places that I could call my own. These were two attics, one on each side of the house. One was cobwebby and had no window. Here I tacked a sheet to the framework of the walls and hung my clothes. In the other I put an army cot, and there in the early

morning I went to meditate. All that I asked in the way of a room was just a little corner that could be mine under all circumstances.

It was during this period that a good teacher came into my life. He had heard of me from mutual friends, and came to Seattle on purpose to see me. He questioned me as to my life. I told him everything. His face, as I talked, showed intense feeling, but no pity, no indignation on my account. When I finished he said quietly, "You have nothing that is your own." And, "You must not cling to phenomena." It was as if a light-clear, white, and very bright-had been turned on in my brain. An unforgettable experience! If he had been sorry for me or tried to comfort me, if he had blamed others and said I was unfairly treated, he would not have touched me. He would not have helped me. But he recognized me as a seeker for God and he forced me to face the truth proper to my state. He cared not at all whether it was painful or not. And from that moment, I, who had been blind, saw. I saw that an attitude that is perfectly justifiable for a bouseholder is poisonous for one who has stepped upon the path of complete renunciation, holding the soul in bondage. I saw that God is a relentless Master, never accepting anything short of perfection, never satisfied if only a part is laid at His feet.

We thank Thee, O Father, for Thine inexorable demands upon us. For refusing to listen to the tearful, little, complaining, whining self. And we pray Thee, deliver us from that self, that we may live in Thee.

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A SPIRITUAL INTERPRETATION OF THE BHAGAVAD GITA By PARAMHANSA YOGANANDA



Chapter 5, Stanza 14

Literal Translation

The Self does not create in men the consciousness of being doers of actions, nor does It force actions on them, nor does It entangle them with the fruits of actions. Delusive Cosmic Nature is the originator of all these (evils).

Spiritual Interpretation

God is the Creator of all, even of Cosmic Delusion; but it is man's response to maya through the misuse of the divine gift of free choice that creates in him the sense of egotism and the desire to act according to its dictates and to enjoy the fruits of actions.

When man exercises discrimination and does not respond to Cosmic Delusion, he uses his free will rightly to choose only the influence of the inner divine wisdom. Thus he escapes the punishment that results from the false conviction of being an independent doer of actions.

Ordinary individuals are guided by natural (Nature-born) tendencies that in fact are unnatural to the divinity of the soul, the perfect image of God. When the consciousness of man is one with God he finds his own consciousness to be free from the influence of Cosmic Delusion and of "human" nature. But when man succumbs to the influence of Cosmic Delusion in human nature, he finds maya to be guiding and controlling his consciousness, creating physical and psychological hazards.

Nature is the consort and servitor of God. One who merges himself

in the Lord finds Nature his servitor.

Cosmic Delusion-A Test for Man's Free Will

Even though the Lord is responsible for creating man and for placing him in Cosmic Delusion as present in Nature, yet He has given His sons the power of free choice—either to yield to the barmful misery-making tempeations of his physical impulses and environment, or to follow the inner guidance of wisdom flowing from God. The ordinary man takes the so-colled easy path of catering to his impulses, a choice that ultimately leads to the destruction of all his happiness. But the yogi uses his God-given free will to follow the inner guidance of conscience and intuitive wisdom and turns over the government of his bodily city to God; thus be regains his lost paradise.

The man identified with his body finds by self-analysis that the consciousness of egotism and the egotistical performance of all actions with the desire to enjoy their fruits originated in his error in responding to the influence of Cosmic Delusion in Nature. Not blaming the immaculate Lord as the Originator of his troubles, the wise man sees that all evils result from misuse of free choice, by which he has

responded to Nature rather than God.

Even though Nature or maya is responsible for the sufferings emanating from man's egocistical performance of actions, nevertheless, by the use of discrimination and will power, he can turn away from Nature to Spirit, ultimately making Nature his own slave even as it is the slave of God.

The devotee can always appeal to the Lord in deepest prayer and say: "Heavenly Pather, I did not wish to be created, nor did I wish to be placed in proximity to alluring evil temprations. Please, O God, since Thou created me and put me to the test of life, without consulting me, bless me that I use my power of free choice to strengthen my will

and follow the path of freedom and not the path of delusion."

The divine omnipresent consciousness of the Lord is aware of all men's prayers. "He that planted the ear, shall he not hear? be that formed the eye, shall he not see? . . . he that teacheth man knowledge, shall not he know?" (Psalms 94:9-10.) God did not create man to suffer, but to overcome all bodily and material limitations by the unconquerable power of the soul.


"He is eternal, all-pervading, stable, immovable, and ancient."

SRF India Hall Celebration



The first anniversary of the opening of SRF India Hall, designed by Master and built by SRF disciples, was celebrated on April 7th with a banquer in the red-and-gold auditorium. More than 250 members of the Fellowship were in attendance. The gathering was presided over by Rajasi Janakananda, successor to Yoganandaji as president of SRF.

The guests were seated at four long tables that were bright with candles and spring flowers. A special feature of the Indian-American dinner was "Calcutta Croquettes." Slices of a huge white birthday cake, decorated with red roses, were served for dessert.

Talks by SRF leaders and a varied program of entertainment followed. The beautiful voice of Miss Helena Sundgren was heard in two songs that she dedicated to Paramhansaji's memory — "Through the Years" by Vincent Youmans and "Song of India" by Rimsky-Korsakov. Mr. John Van Leeuwen of the Los Angeles Conservatory of Music played piano selections from Bath and Debussy.

Mr. Donald Walters read two
of Master's poems, "When I Am
Only a Dream" and "God! God!
God!" Children of the SRF Sunday School sang, first in English
and then in Bengali, three of Yoganandaji's chants—"In the Temple
of Silence," "Under Blue Skies,"
and "O God Beautiful!"—as well
as two Western airs, favorites of
Master's, "Sitting in the Silence"

and "Battle Hymn of the Republic."

Miss Eva Lorraine presented her "Youth Arts" group in a program of dance and dramatic renditions. 
brotherhood of man under the one common Father.

somebody else; he is the master of himself. That is the truth we should recognize. We should be masters of ourselves. Even God does not try to master others. He has given life, consciousness, and free will to us, to live the divine life if we choose. We can never get away from the fact that we cannot live in peace or perfection without a sense of our oneness with God,

"The Christian scriptures give us the same teachings that Master brought to us. The words of any master bring to us the one God.

"For those of us who will make the effort, there is still the same opportunity to receive from Master the same consciousness, the same love that was here when he was present with us in the body. Since his passing our awareness of him has increased many times."

The feeling, the realization, the power of his cosmic consciousness is so great as to be overwhelming. We should not feel that there has been any loss.

"We are still able to be in

Lass Public Rites for the Beloved Master



A thousand mourners attended the last public rites for the beloved master, Paramhansa Yogananda, The partly Christian, partly Vedic ceremonies, conducted by Rajasi Janakananda, were held on March 11th at the Mount Washington Center. Dr. M. W. Lewis and Swami Premananda read inspiring passages from Christian and Hindu scriptures. Beautiful musical selections were played on the pipe organ by Korla Pandit. Shortly after the services had begun, a rainbow of unusually vivid colors appeared in the sky over Mount Washington.

The two-hour services, which ended at 6:00 p.m., were followed by two hours of devotional chanting by Master's disciples. A hundred yellow-robed residents of the SRF centers in southern California filed past the casket, showering the glass lid with rose petals and gaz-

ing with love on the beautiful face of their guru. A screne and spiritually uplifting atmosphere prevailed; all devotees felt Yoganandaji's holy presence among them.

At 10:00 p.m. the casket was removed to Forest Lawn Memorial Park in the nearby town of Glendale. The casket was placed in a crypt of the Forest Lawn Great Mausoleum on March 28th. SRF officers are planning to bring back Master's sacred body to the Mount Washington Center as soon as possible. A shrine will be built on a suitable spot of the twenty-five-acre grounds.

Lovely Floral Tributes

Hundreds of floral offerings were received at the SRF head-quarters from Master's disciples and friends. Beautiful bouquets and sprays were sent by the numerous SRF Centers in America, Canada, and Mexico. The SRF Center in Honolulu dispatched by airplane a sheaf of anthuriums, ti leaves, and rare Hawaiian orchids. An unusual floral gift, sent by Mrs. Clarence Gasque (Mata Devi), was a gilded "tree," five feet

high, whose branches were decorated with lavender orchids.

An immense blanket of green ferns, blue irises, and yellow roses, the gift of Rajasi Janakananda, was placed in front of the casket in the chapel. On the altar, behind the casker, stood a huge arrangement of flowers that depicted the SRF symbol-the white star of the spiritual eye encircled in blue and gold and see within the outline of a lotus flower. The motif of this floral piece, which was sent by the members of the SRF Church in Hollywood, was carried out in white gladioli, white stocks, blue delphiniums, and yellow daffedils.

Two large floral tributes from Master's disciples at Mount Washington were placed near the head and foot of the casket. One was a circular arrangement of white, blue, and yellow flowers to represent the omniscient spiritual eye; the other was an outline in white stocks of a graceful swan against a background of blue delphiniums.

from many of Paramhansaji's countrymen. The orange, white, and green colors of India's flag were displayed in the floral arrangement sent by Consul General Ahuja and Ambassador Sen. The large green wreath was decorated with orange talips, orange bird-of-paradise flowers, and white gardenias.

Beautiful Bronze Casket

The casker in which Master's sacred body was placed is a masterpiece in construction, design, and beauty. No detail was overlooked in the planning of the sarcophagus, no effort spared in the creation of an enduring memorial. Built of solid phosphorous bronze, it is cast in only two pieces —body and top. The top molding is gracefully embellished with plastic ornamentation, which is skillfully blended with artistically sculptured corners and handle mounts—all integral parts of the main body.

The handsomely upholstered interior of the casker displays a rufted silk crepe (a faille type of weave), finished to the last minute detail. It is padded with a submattress and an additional top mattress; there are also a pillow and footrest. The sarcophagus is made airtight and watertight by the use of strong sealing clamps, rubber gaskets, and cement sealer.

Korla Pandit TV Program

Korla Pandit, Hindu musician, dedicated his TV program on March 11th to the memory of Paramhansaji. Many times Master had enjoyed listening to the beautiful organ selections of Mr. Pandit, who appeared daily over the American Broadcasting Company's KECA-TV, Channel 7. On March 11th the noted musician presented "O God Beautiful!"-an ancient Hindu chant much loved by Yoganandaji. Readings on the popular program included Master's triumphant poem, "My Soul is Marching On," and a quatrain from Omaz Khayyam, as follows:

Master's Interpretation

Many years ago Paramhansaji interpreted those lines, as follows:

"At last with the help of the Masters of Self-realization I procured the seed of wisdom. I sowed it in the garden of my mind and ploughed deep furrows of devotion. I regularly sprinkled the wisdom-seed with the waters of daily silence and deep concentration, that it might grow and bear the ever-fragrant fiery flower of immortality. At last I reaped the divine harvest, vaster beyond the imagination of all my expectations for the little spiritual effort I had roade.

"My mind was a river of material desire floating on the tracts of matter. Now the warmth of the fraggant divine fire has evaporated the waters of my life and changed it to a mighty wind of power spreading over the skiey bosom of God.

"The seed of wisdom is implanted by the guru or master of Self-realization, but the soil or receptivity and power of growth must be supplied by the devotee.

"Weak, restless, and mentally unstable, we, like water, remain earth-bound. But when our souls become spiritualized by meditation, we soar like the wind in the amnipresence of space."

Memorial Concert

A memorial concert dedicated to Paramhansaji was given on April 2nd at the Mt. Washington headquarters by Mts. Gladys Kendall and Dr. Antonia Brico. The program, which was for two pianos, included music by Tschaikowsky, Gliere, De Falla, Saint-Saens, Debussy, Ravel, Bach, and Handel.

"Youth Arts" in Premiere of New Ballet, "Mukunda"

A new symbolic ballet had its premiere on June 20th at the Wilsbire Ebell Theater in Los Angeles. The ballet, "Mukunda," is dedicated to Paramhansa Yogananda (whose pre-monastic name was Mukunda) and was inspired by an incident of his childhood. Readers of his Antobiography of a Yogi will recall the kite incident in Lahore — the two kites that broke free from their owners and sailed to the roof where Mukunda stood, as though in answer to his prayer to the Divine Mother.

Many of the variations were composed by the ballet children themselves, even on such deep themes as knocking at the door of creation and conversing with all nature.

The following report is takenfrom the Los Angeles Times:

"A very tiny little girl announced to the audience of the Wilshire Ebell Theater last night that 'a little girl or boy with art as a hobby never becomes a problem. That is our motto.' Her name was Camille Macfarland and she was mistress of ceremonies for the first California Children's Ballet Company, presented by Youth Arts, organized and directed by Eva Lorraine.

"The ballet company is made up entirely of children ranging in age from 3½ to 12 years. Its purpose is to assist children to attain, through the higher expressive arts, their own true Self-realization."

"Judging from the performance given by these children, one came away with the impression that Miss Loraine is having gratifying success in her endeavors. The children all seem to be perfectly attuned to their tasks and it was amazing to behold how even the smallest was entirely serious and concentrated in carrying out her steps and turns.

"One could not help admiring the sense of rhythm, the physical coordination, the grace and skill these children displayed, and once again it became clear what an abundant amount of talent of all kinds one finds among youngsters.

"The program was quite formidable and there was a lot to do and a lot to remember for everyone. About a dozen solo numbers were distributed between the two large ballets of the evening, the 'Nutcracker,' music by Tschaikowsky, and 'Mukunda,' a symbolic ballet written around children's games to music by various composers."

"A Night In Indid"

A program of Indian song, dance, music, and drama wove a delightful spell over an enthusiastic audience that attended an SRF presentation of "A Night in India" on June 14th at the Wilma Hastings Auditorium in Long Beach, California. The entire program was planned, and for the most part executed, by SRF renunciate disciples and students.

Rev. William Brown, minister of the Long Beach SRF Chapel, welcomed the guests and introduced the artists. Among the latter were Miss Heleoa Sundgren, a featured soloist with the Roger Wagner Chorale of Los Angeles, whose renditions of "Song of India," by Rimsky-Korsakov, and "He Shall Feed His Flock," from Handel's The Messiah, brought first a hush of silent appreciation over the house, then a responsive burst of applianse.

Najin Poojara, a student at the University of California, Los Angeles, appeared next on the program, playing the *sitar*, an Indian

stringed instrument.

Miss Sushila Janadas, featured dancer on many stage and television shows, gave generously of her time and artistry, performing "Malike" (the garland dance), and "Diwali" (the dance of the lights), in which the dancer, on a darkened stage, carried a lighted candle in the palm of each gesturing hand.

Rev. Herbert Freed, minister of the Phoenix SRF Church, gave a brief explanation of the yoga postures, or asanas, which were demonstrated by Master Jan Savage, a member of the SRF Hollywood Church Sunday School. The asanas were then performed to music by the Misses Patricia Craig and Sharon Stewart, also of the SRF Sunday School, and by members of "Youth Arts," the first California children's ballet company.

After a brief intermission Miss Sundgren returned for another solo, "The Nightingale and the Rose," by Rimsky-Korsakov. This beautiful number was followed by a short dramatic piece, "The Song of the Sadhu," composed by monks of the SRF Order. Taking part in this charming depiction of the spirituality of life in rural India were Rev. Roland Stevenson, Mr. Leland Standing, Mr. Carmen Johnson, Rev. Herbert Freed, Master Jan Savage, Master Tommy Fedele, and Rev. Donald Walters, Miss Sundgren portrayed in song the voice of Kali (the Divine Mother aspect of God); and Sushila Janadas, accompanied by Najin Poojara on the situr, portrayed Mother Kali's dance of creation in the halls of space.

An Evening of Music

Eighty renunciate disciples of the SRF Order, representing the Mt. Washington, Encinitas, and Hollywood colonies, were guests of Mr. and Mrs. Korla Pandit at aconcert of organ and piano music given by Mr. Pandit on May 23rd at the Long Beach Municipal Auditorium. The program consisted of both classical and semi-classical music, interwoven with the narration of poetry and extracts from India's ancient literature. Mr. Pandit's amazing skill in creating orchestral sounds and the effect of Indian drums on the electric organ highlighted several numbers. The program also included two dances by Bhupesh Guha, complemented by Mr. Pandit's organ renditions of Indian music for drums and stringed instruments, and by striking lighting effects.

Phoenix, Arizona

Fourteen nations were represented in a Day of Nations Festival on June 12th at Phoenix, Arizona. More than 3,000 spectators were present. The program, which featured songs and dances of various countries, and dramatic pieces, also included a demonstration of yoga annuar by Rev. Roy Davis of the SRF Phoenix Church.

Ranchi, Bihar, India

Yogoda Sat-Sanga Brahmacharya Vidyalaya, boys' school founded by Yoganandaji in 1918 at Ranchi, was closed for seven days, from March 10th through March 16th, to observe mourning for the passing of the great guru. The students of the Vidyalaya observed a day of fasting, with prayers and songs in honor of the revered Master, whom they were not privileged to see in person but whose magnetic love they feel when they kneel in prayer before his photo each morning and evening.

The disciples of Paramhansaji, and other devotees and members of the Yogoda Sat-Sanga Ashram at Ranchi, observed a ten-day mourning period, following the strict disciplines and rituals enjoined by the Hindu scriptures.

On March 18th a special memorial service was held. The prayer hall was decorated with flowers and green leaves; the picture of Master was beautifully garlanded, and sweet-smelling flowers were heaped on the raised platform. Incense, symbolizing purity, was borned, adding to the prayerful mood of the devotees.

Special prayers were offered, with chanting of ancient Sanskrit scrip-





This was followed by hom-jangya (burning of sacrificial fire) and chanting of Vedic mantras (chants). The entire Bhagarad Gita was read aloud, followed by kirtan (the singing of loving songs to God).

At noon sampasis (wandering renunciates), mendicants, and beggars (daridra-narayan) were fed. Prosbad (food offered to God) was distributed among the YSS devotees, who numbered about 200. In the afternoon several chapters from Paramhansa Yoganandaji's Autobiography of a Yogi were read to the assemblage.

On the following day, March

19th, another large gathering was held at the Vidyalaya under the leadership of Sj. Ram Kishore Roy, at which time the events of Paramhansaji's holy life were reviewed.

"As the first Monday in every August is declared by the government a public holiday, we took that opportunity (in 1951) to celebrate the second anniversary of the SRF Acera Center. VISIONS OF THE GURU

Many SRF students have written to headquarters to tell of their visions of Master. While true (superconscious) visions are rare, there was undoubtedly a great beightening of spiritual awareness among Paramhansaji's devotees around the time of his passing. Many saw him in truth and not in imagination.

Mrs. Grace Thompson Seton, noted author, and a disciple of Master's for more than twenty years, writes from Miami Beach, Florida:

The Radians Master

"On March 11th, at the time of the services in Los Angeles, I was meditating here before Master's photograph and a silver box containing rose leaves from the Keiya initiation. The picture and box were encircled in fresh red roses. Suddenly I was in the chapel at Mr. Washington. I saw all the disciples dimly in the background, as I stood beside the coffin. Master was standing, his right hand upraised, in front of the coffin and about three feet away from it, blessing all who passed by. They went between him and his 'shell' in the coffin. He was radiant. He blessed me as I passed, and blessed the roses around his picture too-for I was in both places at once, in a fourth-dimensional sense."

Mr. James E. Ampah of Cape Coast, Gold Coast, West Africa, who is executive secretary and treasurer of the SRF African Branches, wrote on April 4th:

Testimony from West Africa

"On receipt of the cablegram on March 10th, I relaved the news by telegrams to all SRF Centers in the country, that they might observe funeral services on the eleventh for our beloved Master. On Toesday, March 11th, about 4:30 p.m., I entered into quiet meditation with the divine determination that I should be permitted to see Guruii's face to console my soul.

'One and a half hours passed in this sacred quest, when suddenly I found myself among the SRF members and mourners of Guruii at Mt. Washington. It was a solemn occasion, but the beautiful expression on Master's face as he lay in the coffin gave me such joy that I shouted: 'He is not dead; he is with my Great Guru Babaji!'

"At my shout my little daughter came in and tapped me on the shoulder. The vision ended.

"The passing of Master has created a great sensation here. Streams of letters have been pouring in to the center, Guruji, in very truth, performed selfless service from the beginning of his life up to the end of it. Lecturing about God and dying in God have indeed demonstrated his faithfulness to suffering humanity. "Master was able to work out some of the karma of those of us whose feet are just entering the deep river of truth. Like Christ, Guruji has fulfilled his mission on earth. As John the Baptist was a berald for the coming of Christ, so Guruji prepared the way of the Truth for us to follow, to receive the same Christ Consciousness that was in Jesus.

"When I first read in the January-February issue of the magazine about the demise of Sister Gyanamata and the part that Paramhansaji had played in the drama of this saintly sister's life, I intuitively felt that Guruji had been withholding her from death in order that he and she might travel on rogether.

"As Sister's body could no longer bear the strain of the world karma, she was released. A great soul like Sister has completed her mission. But a greater soul, in the person of Guruji, has left us a priceless heritage in the SRF lessons. I always find him in my lessons and in that great book, Autobiography of a Yogi.

"A special Memorial Service will be held at Easter, April 11-13th, at Nsawam. There holy tributes will be paid by all SRF disciples in honor of Guruji. Paramhansaji has gained access to the purely spiritual world. May we also find joy in his work well done."
